

Dear Friends of CJM,

We want to express our gratitude to all who support our mission. Whether you donated food, clothing and hygiene items, visited or wrote letters to the incarcerated, gave your time in our office, supported one of our events, worked on one of our buildings, or provided financial support, you joined with us to follow Jesus' example of honoring the dignity of those marginalized in our society.

This has been an extraordinary year for CJM and those we serve. Just like you, we had to make hard decisions to limit our activities in order to protect each other. Our access to visit and bring services to inmates has been cut off or extremely limited since March. COVID-19 has had a terrible impact on jails and prisons across the country, including here in Missouri where the Department of Corrections reported at least 4 staff and 30 inmates have died due to COVID.

Our work continues, despite the restrictions. While our office is open, we are not seeing clients at First Services. Our Let's Start support groups and healthy relationships groups still serve 25 to 40 women in their online sessions. Since June, we have provided 18 people with assistance to prevent eviction or loss of utilities, and helped 17 people move into housing through assistance with deposits and their first month's rent. Although our office was closed during the stay-at-home order, over 470 individuals still received emergency services in the form of bus passes, backpacks with hygiene supplies, obtaining vital papers, or work boots and uniforms. Over 93 formerly incarcerated individuals were served through our Release-to-Rent programs, wherein we placed them in an apartment and assisted them to obtain work, achieve financial stability, and reintegrate into society.

During this time of challenges, we are especially grateful for those who make it possible for our work to continue because you recognize the benefits to society of our success, and you may also respond to the moral calling to serve the marginalized. In memoriam of Mr. Albert McNorton Jr.

It is with great sadness that CJM informs of the untimely passing of Mr. Albert McNorton Jr. from a heart attack on November 20, 2020. Mr. McNorton was a veteran and a client in CJM's Release to Rent Veterans (R2R) program. He entered the program in November 2019 shortly after his release from a Missouri correctional facility. Despite his history of being in-and-out of facilities for substance use, Mr. McNorton demonstrated grit and determination to turn his life around. Doug Evans, CJM Case Manager, describes Mr. McNorton as "soft-spoken, personable, compassionate and caring, very friendly, and an ideal client," and says, "we will miss him as a client and as a human being."

Mr. McNorton was ready to successfully complete the R2R program. He was making connections with his family but did not try to rebuild family relationships until he was successfully established independently. He loved his family so much. Mr. McNorton was doing everything he could to get his life together, not just for himself, but for his family as well. Mr. McNorton lived a great life while in the R2R program and was a mentor to a new client in the program. Mr. McNorton was sober the whole year and was saving up money to buy himself a car. He was on the path of successfully establishing himself independently, giving back to the community, and being an upstanding citizen of society. Mr. McNorton will be buried at Jefferson Barracks. We will miss Mr. McNorton, and we extend our sincerest condolences to his family.
